Picking up the reins

This is my first review of a year at the helm of the Arundel Castle Cricket Foundation, since taking the reins from the great Johnny Barclay. On putting pen to paper, I have to admit to feeling a touch under pressure, knowing all too well the literary skills he possesses and the joy his reviews have given to our supporters over so many years. Whilst I cannot promise to match Johnny's eloquence, I promise to bring the same passion for creating positive

opportunities for young people and supporting those in need towards brighter futures.

Following a wonderful handover from Johnny and Annie, I spoke to hundreds of people connected to our Charity and I have been quite overwhelmed by the amount of goodwill that exists towards us. It is clear our Charity's strengths remain the desire of many: our reputation for bringing joy and educational opportunities to hundreds of young people that need it most year on year; our ground, the castle, its gardens and surrounding woodland; our solid financial position and governance; our loyal supporters; and our independence. Talking to so many people offered an incredible insight into how we ensure the Foundation continues to support so many children and young people.

Responding to the Pandemic

It goes without saying that 2020 was certainly not the first year I envisaged! I recall, back in early March, looking forward excitedly to the planned Spring and Summer programme, plans which had to change when Covid 19 struck.

The sudden lockdown restrictions imposed in the middle of March changed our plans overnight. Unfortunately, it was quickly clear that we would be unable to bring young people down from Inner London as we had intended. We were determined that our unique space could continue to provide a much-needed facility to support local communities and those households negatively impacted during these difficult times. So, we acted with creativity and agility to develop and deliver an alternative range of programmes at every stage of the lockdown restrictions.

Over one thousand children and family members visited us over the Spring and Summer for restorative and enjoyable charitable and cricketing experiences. Together with the Friends of Arundel Castle Cricket Club, who once again delivered a wonderfully eclectic range of fixtures, the ground at Arundel Castle was used on an average of 6 days a week from May 27th to September 21st. I will be amazed if there is a cricket ground in this country that delivered that volume of activity.

To that end, huge credit must go to James Rufey and his team at the Club, with whom we continue to enjoy a hugely productive and collaborative relationship.

The speed with which lockdown occurred and the frequency of change during the following months meant we had to act fast and with purpose at all times.

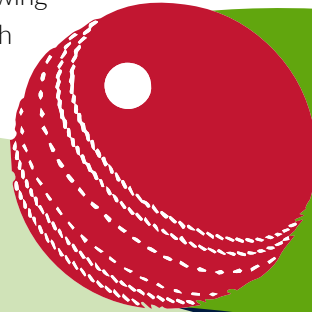

At the start of the year we had intended to explore how digital activities could increase the outcomes of our work – increasing the support we offer to our visiting students before and after their stay with us. We had not imagined this would become a key focus when the UK entered the first full national lockdown in March.

Yet just a month later we had our “Virtual Arundel Experience” up and running for children with additional needs. The “Big 6 Challenge” provided specially designed resources for use in special educational needs schools.

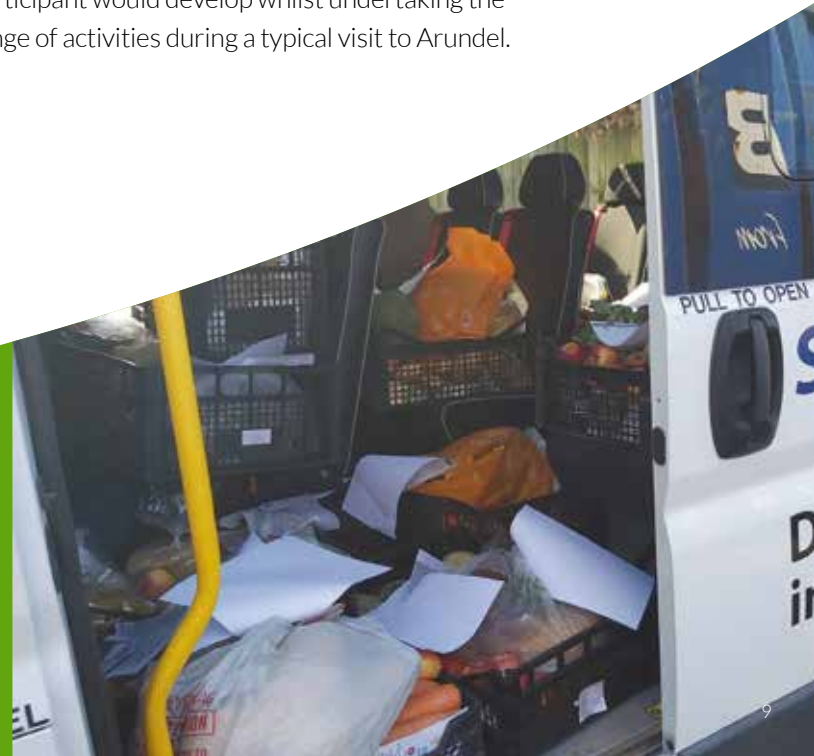

The activities, completed by 114 young people, combined life and sensory skills that each participant would develop whilst undertaking the range of activities during a typical visit to Arundel.

We supported Steyning Grammar School's Outreach project to deliver 3,000 food parcels to 175 vulnerable families. We are an education charity and many of these children were being cited as at risk of falling out of education altogether.



Family Bubbles

Over the years the Foundation has looked to support and inspire children with additional needs. We knew that many such families had been struggling more than usual during lockdown. It was important that as lockdown eased, and families were once again allowed outside, that we looked to help those most in need. Our Play Zones were formed with that very much in mind.

Launched before the end of May, our Family Play Zones provided safe and private space for families with children with disabilities. This proved to be a hugely beneficial intervention, with over 200 participants. Whilst public spaces were open, they were often entirely unsuitable for these children and their families. Some families played cricket, some just rolled down the banks, but quite frankly it didn't matter as all were grateful for the safe outdoor activity space after some very challenging months stuck indoors.

Bubbles of Six

At the start of the year, we had anticipated welcoming more than 1,000 young people to our delightful Arundel setting, to take to the field or to wonder in the magic of the surroundings. As lockdown eased further in early June, our attention could turn to how we could expand our reach and welcome more people to the Castle Ground.

The new rules meant that groups of up to six people from different households could interact with each other. Our Target Zones, created with that in mind, enabled 80 young people to come together and have those very basic experiences they were denied by Covid... of picking up a bat and a ball and playing together... of talking, laughing, and having fun together. Those everyday activities we take for granted are so important for our mental and physical wellbeing.

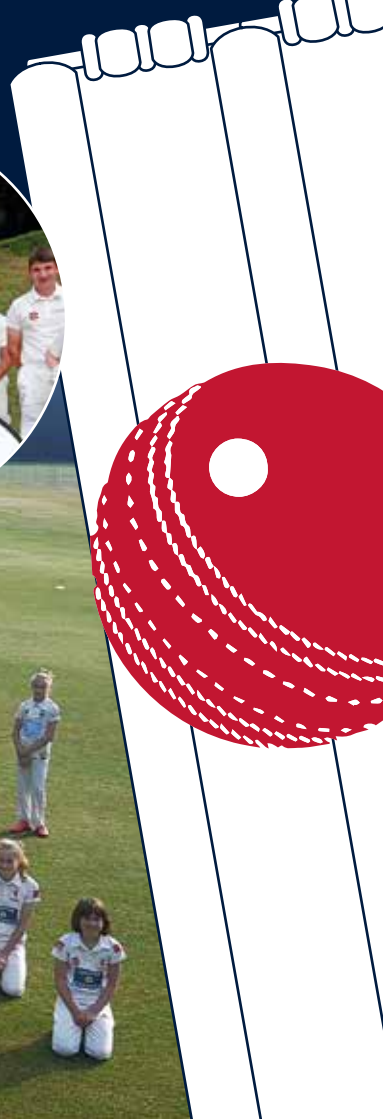

Return to the Wicket

On the 11th July, cricket was given the greenlight to return to the field. Our “Celebration of Cricket for All at Arundel” went live two weeks later on the 25th July, and for me, represented the product of exciting and innovative thinking from the Foundation and a host of our amazing partners.

It was lovely to see a difficult and unprecedented Summer culminate with a range of new and exciting cricketing activities. I must express my heartfelt thanks for the hugely generous gesture from one of our Donors who supported us to use Arundel to kickstart cricket for the diverse range of cricketing groups we

know love the game, and to make 2020 memorable for all the right reasons. Together with the Friends of Arundel Castle Cricket Club, we delivered the “Celebration of Cricket for All at Arundel” series. What followed were a series of cricket matches and activity days for a broad array of cricketing groups and cricketing charities who support our vision.





The first of our 'Celebration of Cricket for All at Arundel' events took place on Thursday 30th July in support of the Ruth Strauss Foundation. With the ground bathed in red, 26 families, all dressed in red, came to have fun and to play games to raise money and awareness for a great cause. The Ruth Strauss Foundation supports families facing the death of a parent from cancer & drives the need for more research into non-smoking lung cancers.

Through our partnership with the Sussex Cricket Foundation, we saw over 150 young people participate in two hugely enjoyable events. Firstly, an “Allstars” day of cricket for youngsters aged between 5-8 coming from all over Sussex. Secondly, a day of softball competition for Women and Girls as part of the ECB’s “Women’s Big Cricket Month” campaign in September.

We hosted an England Pan-Disability XI against a strong team of local club players. The England side were made up of players from the England Learning Disability, England Physical Disability and England Deaf teams. The standard of cricket was very high and hugely enjoyable.

Through our partnership with the Aldridge Foundation, we welcomed the students from the Brighton Aldridge Community Academy to join us on two occasions. We are great admirers of their purpose and were delighted to see them named as one of only four state secondary schools in the Cricketer Magazine's Top 100 Senior Schools for cricket in the country in its Schools Guide 2020. They also provided five players that formed our ACCF XI that took on the Lords and Commons XI, with the rest of the team made up of male and female players from inner London, disabled groups, and from local state schools and clubs.

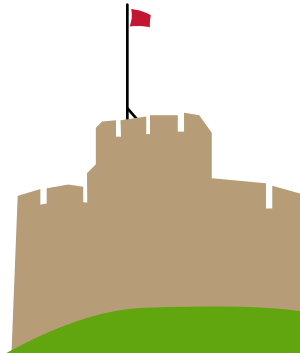


Our Future

The social context has always been important here at Arundel. Johnny once described a visit to Arundel as like something from the pages of C.S. Lewis – of pushing through the wardrobe and stepping into a new land, one full of optimism, opportunity and new experiences. I see my role, my responsibility, to continue that. Those inequalities the Foundation has been tackling for years; of social, economic, health and educational disparity, have only been worsened during the pandemic, with issues highlighted and brought to a wider audience through the voice of the Black Lives Matter campaign and other social movements. Under my tenure the Foundation will continue offering an experience that expands horizons, raises aspiration, allowing young people to look forward positively.

I want to see how the Foundation and all its supporters can continue making a real difference through cricket, through Arundel and its inspirational setting, and through the hard work and dedication of our Trustees, staff and partners.

A new two-year strategy will guide our work. This timeframe is deliberate – allowing us to respond to the pandemic, yet also fully investigating and exploring our core offering while testing new models. Our plans have been informed by our consultation, using that insight to shape what the future of the Arundel Castle Cricket Foundation should look like, what issues we should address and how we continue to make a lasting impact on the communities we connect with.



A New Strategy

Our new strategy will focus on engaging young people from inner London boroughs, young people with special educational needs and disabilities, and young people living in communities local to Arundel. For each of these groups we will seek to boost inclusion, inspire education and improve mental and physical health.

We will provide young people with the tools and confidence they need to learn, grow and succeed. Our strategy will be built on partnerships – cementing our existing arrangements while also engaging new organisations who share our vision. This approach will enable us to be effective within a competitive sector, and one continuing to evolve as the pandemic does.

We acknowledge, particularly in the case of London youngsters who may only visit us once or twice, that collaborating with other London based organisations will enhance our ability to make a more sustainable, tangible difference to these young people. We welcome conversations and dialogue with any partners and organisations who believe they can support the delivery of our strategy.

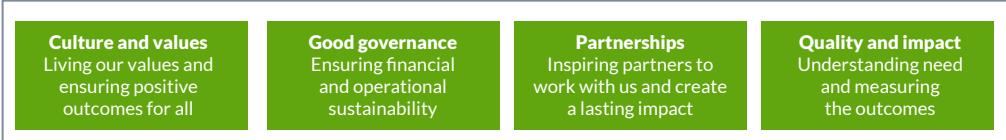

Our Communities

- The Charity's focus has been on London children in recent years. Whilst a high level of focus will remain in this area, we will increase our levels of support to local communities.
- Supporting young people with special educational needs and disabilities remains a high priority. To enhance what we do, we will define what 'gold standard' looks like and aim for it. We will consider investing in our facilities to reach it.
- We aim to work with a minimum of 1,000 young people each year.



Our Outcomes

- Having always focussed on inclusion and education, we will increase the emphasis on health and wellbeing, in particular on young people's mental health.





Our Activities

- Whilst our cricketing programme reveals our passionate belief in the benefits of outdoor recreation, we will establish a new digital platform that can enhance our levels of engagement with young people, before and after their visit
- Using the acres of woodland “beyond the boundary”, we will incorporate new nature-based aspects within our programmes
- We will develop new activities aimed at improving mental and physical health
- We will develop the concept of the “Arundel Way” - a set of values and attributes that will feature across all our programmes. We will strive to ensure young people visiting us leave with an aspirational commitment to the Arundel Way to help guide them through the challenges they face in life.



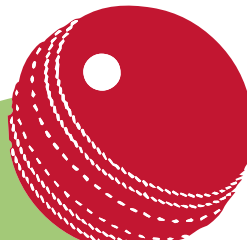
